An exceptionally skillful or successful person


So, what will we be doing!?




SUPERHERO CHARACTER BRAINSTORM


NOW IT'S YOUR TURN!

Today, artists take the form of the comic strip in many directions...










Graphic Novels

A novel that tells a story through images—either in traditional comic format or in an experimental style.




Zines



COMIC ART ELEMENTS


ICONS

The more abstract an image, the more universally meaningful it is. For example, ©. The more realistic an image, the more particular it is to a certain story.




LINE

How can we use line to convey different emotions?








TIME AND MOTION

Comic artists show time and motion through different techniques and transitions between scenes.









SEEN AND UNSEEN

Comics show what is happening in a moment, as well as things that we are not able to see in real life (like thought bubbles or flashbacks). They also rely on the reader to piece together the story without giving every detail.













